Australian raised Japonica, it grew at the original Camellia Grove c. 1870s and is named after its pioneer grower. Described by Jennifer Trehane as "glowing red, neat

upright, compact habit & glossy leaves".

S. Macoboy describes it as "dark crimson with occasional petaloids", and another internet entry says dark crimson with single or semi double flowers.

Officially named in 1941, (long after the grower had died), its parentage not confirmed, but there are entries on the internet that suggest it is a sport of Jean Lyne ?. Alexander's nephew, George Linton transplanted this to his family property at Somersby NSW where it is thought to have gone on to produce sports.





Chanel and the white Camellia.

In Gaujacq (south west)France, where there is ideal growing conditions, there is over 2,700 Camellia specimens specially grown, without the use of chemicals, at the Chanel nursery. Philippe Grandry, Head of Cultivation at Chanel and, since



1998, working alongside master botanist, Jean Thoby (pic.left) oversee the production and harvest and development of Camellia



flowers for the products of the house of Chanel, with their cosmetics and fragrances featuring the Camellia Japonica Alba Pena, which is one of the

oldest known Japonicas.. Described as having porcelain-white formal double flowers and over 100 petals, c. Alba Plena was first cultivated in 1797.

The flowers are harvested one by one each morning and placed gently in baskets by handlers. The flowers are weighed, then frozen which is to preserve 100% of their potent ingredients, after this they are taken to the Chanel laboratory.

It is said that the White Camellia attracted Coco Chanel, for it's "simplicity, shape, purity and vitality" and the Japonica Alba Pena was chosen for its resilience against winter frosts. Coco did not want a flower's fragrance to interfere with her famous No 5 perfume.

A white blossom was offered to her c. 1913, by the love of her life Arthur Capel. It is thought she fell in love with the camellia after reading Alexandre Dumas' 'La Dame aux Camélias', a story in which the heroine always wore a white camellia, showing to the world that her heart remained true and pure, the white camellia became her iconic symbol."



Gabrielle "Coco" Chanel, famous French fashion designer and business woman, over the years extended her collections with a camellia featured, to include jewellery, materials, buttons, headwear, jacket lapels, watches and spectacles, and even a chandelier in her apartment with camellias on it..



In the spring of 2013, the Fine Jewelry collection inspiration came from the *"house's iconic flower"*.

In Asia the camellia symbolises purity and longevity, and in Japan its name means "excellence without pretension" - It is said that this defines Chanel.

Its planting time.....





There's still time to plant spring flowering bulbs which are now available at your garden centre. Add **Rapid Raiser** throughout the soil. In the spring, once they've finished flowering, is the best time to fertilise as that's when the bulb will store nutrition for the following seasons' flowers.

WINTER VEGETABLES

Plant garlic and other winter vegetable crops. Add **Human Beans** throughout the garden bed The composted poultry manure and composted coffee grounds is an excellent combination, ensuring a great result for your veggies. Water in well using **GOGO Juice**.
